Gentlemen,

I present to you the Annual Report of the City of Norwich Police Department for the year 2013.

In 2013 the Norwich Police began the year with one position vacant. As the year progressed, the staffing of the police force was at times decreased by six officers. The shortage was caused by a new-hire attending the police academy and unprecedented on-duty injuries and personal illness. The numbers in this report reflect these absences. Many of the absences took place during the summer months, which is normally the busiest time of year for the department.

A testament to the fortitude and professionalism of the officers of the Norwich Police, they all worked extra shifts for many weeks, with little notice from the population we serve. While all shifts were covered and all complaints answered, we recognized this was not a desirable, safe or efficient means to deliver police services.

In the pages that follow are some noteworthy items of interest concerning cases handled by the Norwich Police. Further in the report is 2013 statistical data in chart format.

JANUARY

The year 2013 started with the Norwich Police Department roster one police officer short because of a resignation in December 2012. Keeping the police force at full minimum staffing is always a priority. Actions were undertaken to fill this vacant position as soon as possible. The Norwich Police used the existing Civil Service list and began canvassing candidates from this list.

January 7, 2013 - This first Monday in January was the day children returned to school after the Christmas winter break. It was also the first day children returned to school since the tragic murders at an elementary school in Newtown, CT. More than 25 people were killed by a lone gunman at this school in Connecticut. A Norwich Police officer was assigned to each school building in the city limits, including the private faith based schools. Posting of officers at school entrances during drop-off and pick-up times continued for the remainder of the school year.



FEBRUARY

February 2013 - Neighbors surrounding a house at 7 State St contacted the Norwich Police about suspicious activity taking place at that residence. Information was turned over to Dep/Chief Rodney Marsh who began surveillance of the residence. With assistance from detectives from the Chenango County Sheriff's Office and the New York State Police Community Narcotics Enforcement Team (C-NET) the officers began a covert investigation into the sale of illegal substances from 7 State Street. This investigation continued for several weeks. As this investigation progressed it was determined 'crack' cocaine was the most commonly sold substance from this address.

MARCH

March 17, 2013 - Members of the Norwich Police participated in the annual raising of the Irish flag in downtown Norwich. This year, County Judge Frank Revoir continued the tradition started by retired County Judge W.H. Sullivan of honoring the large Irish community in Norwich.

March 2013 - For nearly 20 years, members of the Norwich Police with military experience have been assigned to the Police Recruit training academy. Their mission is to introduce recruits to the para-military environment of a law enforcement career. For the past three years, PO Justin Carpenter, a US Marine Iraq war veteran, has been a Drill Instructor as the Zone 6 Police Academy.



MARCH

March 18, 2013 - After conducting interviews of candidates from the Civil Service list for Police Officer, ADAM FRANCIS was selected to fill the vacant position. Officer Francis began his career with the police department after being sworn in at a Common Council meeting. Officer Francis is a US Army trained Medic and currently serves in Co. B, 403rd Civil Affairs Bn., Utica, New York. Basic police training for Officer Francis took place at the Zone 6 Law Enforcement Training Academy in Binghamton, New York.

MARCH

March 20, 2013 - After a month long investigation into the sale of illegal substances from 7 State Street, members of the Norwich Police and Chenango County Sheriff's Office executed a Search Warrant at the residence. Inside four people were arrested, two males, two females. One of the men was from Vestal, New York. Also seized as evidence from this house were quantities of illegal substances, US currency and articles of drug paraphernalia.


APRIL

The City of Norwich Police received recognition from the New York Conference of Mayors (NYCOM) for our shared services program with the Norwich City School District. Norwich was one of several communities that submitted programs for consideration. Our program was deemed the most useful and innovative receiving 1ST Place award recognition. The Shared Services agreement between the Police Department and the school district gives the School District police services which in the past were billed to the School district for such events as varsity football and basketball games, student dances and others. In return the School District provides Information Technology (IT) support to the city.

MAY

May 2012 - The Norwich Police actively participate with the Norwich School District to promote safe, fun and interesting after school activities. Officers were assigned to the After Prom Party at the Norwich YMCA. In the following week a Norwich Officer greets the Senior Class prior to their three-day trip and offers some safety tips for being tourist in a metropolitan area. Also in May of 2013, Norwich Police officers assisted with the "Mock Crash" at the Otselic Valley Central School.

Memorial Day weekend in Norwich is all things cars. Beginning Friday afternoon officers were on duty at the Chenango County Fairgrounds assisting with traffic as car show vendors arrive. At the same time officers were in the downtown area setting up for the B.I.D. Cruise-In on the park square. Friday, Saturday and Sunday thousands of car enthusiasts descend on Norwich. During the weekend, teams of four officers alternate between traffic duty on East Main Street and patrolling the grounds.







JUNE

June 28, 2013 - At about 8:00pm a gentleman came to the police station to report his wife missing. At the time of the report the region was experiencing heavy rainfall and flooding. The missing woman left their home and never made it to her place of employment in Clinton, NY. The area surrounding Clinton, NY had several roads washed out and highways under water. The Norwich Police coordinated a massive multi-day search effort involving many Central New York law enforcement agencies. The searching was conducted by vehicle, on foot, Forest Ranger airboat and by NYSP helicopter. On July 1, 2013 the missing woman's car was located in the Town of Norwich, just south of the city limits. Search efforts now moved to this area involving all available assets. On July 3, 2013 at approximately 9:30 am, Norwich Police officers and K9 Weeks located the deceased female in waters of the flooded Chenango River south of the city limits, adjacent to the NYS&W railroad tracks. An autopsy determined the death was not a criminal act.

JULY

July 4, 2013 - For the first time in memory, the 4th of July fireworks display at the Chenango County Fair Grounds was canceled because the Chenango River had flooded the area.

July 12, 13,14, 2013 - Police officers close East Main Street from North Broad Street to Silver Street early Friday morning. As soon as the street is closed, scores of Gus Macker basketball hoops and courts are set up. The street remains closed until late Sunday evening as thousands of 3-on-3 players and spectators watch 16 hours per day of street basketball.





JULY

After several minutes of trial and error and the use of any and all equipment found in the trunk of a patrol car, intern Testani was successful in retrieving the toy from the storm drain.

AUGUST

August 6-11, 2013 - One of the largest events in the County each year is the Chenango County Fair held on the fair grounds on East Main Street. This week long event requires Norwich Police officers to work extra duty, some on overtime, to police the grounds. Each year the Norwich Police are assisted by NYS Troopers.







AUGUST

August 23, 2013 - The President of the United States, Barack Obama, visited Upstate NY for a week long bus tour. One of the stops was Binghamton University. Campus police sent out a request for assistance and Norwich Police Officers Timothy Annesi, Brandon Clarke and Adam Francis were assigned to the security detail.

SEPTEMBER

September 9—13, 2013 - The first week of the 2013-2014 School year begins with a police officer assigned to each school building. On duty officers and night shift officers were held over to patrol and assist with the traffic, reminding drivers of the proper and efficient manner to drop off students at each school. This includes Holy Family School and Valley Heights Christian Academy.

September 6, 7,& 8 2013 - The Colorscape Arts Festival took place in both East and West Parks on the Court House Square. Hundreds of vendors and thousands of spectators are in attendance during the event. Norwich Police officers assisted by the Chenango County Fire Police ensure the many visitors cross NYS Rte. 12 safely. Police officers patrol the downtown area on foot to provide guidance, directions and assistance as needed.




Spectators and musicians make good use of the newly constructed stage in East Park. Concerts and performances are scheduled all day and well into the evening.



OCTOBER

During the year 2013 the City of Norwich transferred all payroll time sheets and records to ADP on-line data entry. This system has greatly assisted the Police Department and Human Resource Department with accurate record keeping of time off and pay roll.



October 2013 - Norwich Police officers assist and maintain a presence at many annual Fall events. On the weekend of October 4, 5, & 6 police officers provide 24 hour coverage of the Pumpkin Festival. On Saturday October 26th members of the force provide traffic assistance and detours for the Halloween Parade. And finally on October 31st, extra officers supplement the regularly scheduled officers to provide saturation patrols in all areas of the City for Trick-or-Treat activities. Police officers patrol in cars, on foot and on bicycles for several hours during the Halloween period.


OCTOBER


October 2, 2013 - A house located at 7A State Street that was the target of a Search Warrant drug raid was torn down. At the time of the raid, the house was in a dilapidated state. Within days of the house being razed, the new landowner began construction of a duplex home.

October 2, 2013 - Dep Chief Scott Burlison and PO Justin Carpenter were requested to assist with training Chenango County Probation officers in techniques of defensive tactics and handcuffing at a day long class.





OCTOBER

October 15, 2013 - In the summer of 2013 Norwich Police received complaints of suspected drug activity at a residence at 21 Plymouth Street. An investigation was commenced, and this particular investigation was made difficult because the house was no longer on the tax rolls and no one was responsible for the building. Intelligence gathered during this investigation indicated the house was occupied by different people at any given time. Officers were able to gather enough evidence to obtain a Search Warrant and a dynamic entry was conducted by Norwich Police officers and Chenango County Sheriff's deputies. Several people were arrested and quantities of heroin, cash and paraphernalia were seized.

OCTOBER

October 26, 2013 - At approximately 1:40 am Norwich Police received a call of two men fighting on West Midland Drive. PO Clarke and his K9 partner Weeks were the first to arrive and encountered two drunken brothers, ages 19 and 21. As PO Clarke approached them he was immediately met with a verbal barrage of profanities from one of the men. PO Clarke attempted to take this male into custody. The other male came to the aid of his brother and made efforts to prevent PO Clarke from making the arrest. Both men physically attacked PO Clarke who was using 'every tool on his belt' including his baton and pepper spray. PO Clarke returned to his patrol car and brought K9 Weeks into the fight. As the physical attack continued, PO Clarke concentrated on one brother while Weeks maintained a grip on the other. POs Purdy and Rotundo soon arrived and both drunken men were taken into custody. Several charges were filed against the brothers including weapons charges for taking a police officer's baton and assaulting a police animal. Weeks later received treatment from Dr. Michael King, DVM for injuries received.




NOVEMBER

During 2013 there were at least three assaults on Norwich Police officers. Two of the officers were required to be absent from duty for an extended period because of the assault injuries. A trend was apparent that people were acting more confrontational with police officer encounters. It was determined that officers needed a new tool to protect themselves short of deadly force. In September of 2013, PO Justin Carpenter attended the Taser® Instructor's Course in Cortland, NY. The department ordered three Taser "less-than-lethal" weapons. Over a period of two weeks, nearly all Norwich Police officers were trained in the safe and effective use of this energy weapon. After training, officers have the option of carrying the Taser on their duty belts.


